
Ministry

Dear Parent/Carer,

I am writing to you in relation to the **Minimum Standards Tests for Year 10 students**. As you may be aware, the achievement of the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) Minimum Standards are prerequisite for students studying the HSC. NESA requires students to meet this standard in the following three areas: **Reading, Writing and Numeracy**, before they receive their HSC.

In 2024 the first round of testing for Year 10 students will be held in Week 10, immediately after Easter break, on <u>Tuesday 2nd April Period 3 and Wednesday 3 April Periods 1 and 4.</u>
Please note these are changes to the original periods published in Week 8.

We ask that all Year 10 students be present on these days.

The tests are administered online, and it is important that all students <u>bring their device, fully charged</u>, on <u>Tuesday 2nd April (immediately after Easter Monday break)</u>. Students in Year 10 will receive separate communication regarding the tests and are aware of their responsibility in bringing their devices on this day. Some support information is contained at the end of this letter.

In terms of the tests themselves, each test runs for 45 minutes. The Reading and Numeracy tests will include 45 multiple choice questions and the Writing test will require your child to respond to a question based on a prompt or stimulus. If your child has been diagnosed with a learning, sensory or physical disability, he/she will be provided with a fair opportunity to respond to the online literacy and numeracy tests as required.

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Notes for Students in Preparing for the Minimum Standards Tests

Equipment:

You may take a **pen/pencil** and a ruler into the minimum standard tests. The test supervisor will provide blank paper once you enter the test room. You need a **fully charged device** and to have downloaded the **NESA Lockdown Browser** (as per the emailed instructions.)

The following items are not allowed in the examination room:

- Mobile phones, smartwatches, or programmable watches
- Calculators
- Dictionaries
- Notes

Test details:

Reading and Numeracy tests are in a multiple-choice question format (45 minutes).

Writing test is a typed response of approximately 500 words in response to a question or picture (maximum 45 minutes).

- You must stay on the test site for the duration of the test session.
- It is a breach of test rules to access other sites, use other applications or use a calculator other than the one provided within the test and that such action will be recorded.
- If any breach of test rules or malpractice is found to have occurred, including the writing of responses that are considered offensive, your test attempt may be declared invalid and you may not be permitted to re-sit the test for a period of up to 12 months.

On test day:

- 1. You will be given your PIN letter which contains the test URL, your student number and PIN to log in to the tests.
- 2. You must accept the conditions in order to sit the test.
- 3. When the supervisor tells you to start, read the instructions and log in using your student number and PIN.
- 4. You can then begin the test. The time that you have remaining to complete the test will display at all times on the top right hand corner of the page.
- 5. Once you have finished the test, select 'Submit and finish'.

NSW Education Standards Authority



The HSC minimum standard has been introduced to ensure students have the reading, writing and numeracy skills needed for everyday life, work and further study.

What this means for students

Students need to meet the HSC minimum standard to receive the HSC. To show they meet this standard, students need to achieve Level 3 in short online reading, writing and numeracy tests. Schools will help students to decide when they are ready to take each test. Students get six chances a year to sit each test if they are in year 12, and four chances a year in years 10 and 11. Students may take tests up to five years after successfully completing their first HSC course.

Only students who meet the HSC minimum standard will receive an HSC testamur.

Provisions and exemptions

Students do not need to meet the HSC minimum standard to:

- · study HSC courses
- · sit HSC exams
- · receive HSC assessment and exam results
- · receive an ATAR
- · receive a Record of School Achievement.

Provisions are available for some students with disability. Some students with a disability studying Life Skills courses may also be exempt from meeting the minimum standard to receive their HSC testamur.

Please find in Compass the Interim Report for your child relating to their first term of Year 7 - 11. The Interim Report is not a full academic report, this will be issued following the completion of Semester One. The purpose of this report is to provide parents and carers with meaningful and timely feedback regarding their child's commencement of the 2024 academic year.

Students in Years 7 - 11 have been assessed on their learning attributes not the academic results attained to date. These simple criteria have been applied, are self-explanatory and aim to give parents and carers a basic overview of their child's progress and the manner in which they have settled into their learning for 2024 here at St Mary's.

This report can be a basis of conversation with the student's teachers and, depending on trends identified, could be the source of intervention that leads to greater level of support being offered.

Bookings for Year 7 – 11 Student/Parent/Teacher (SPT) Conferences will be available via Compass from Tuesday 26 March and you are encouraged to take this opportunity to meet with your child and their teachers. The SPT Conferences will be held over two days:

- Thursday 4th April 3.30pm 7.00pm
- Friday 3rd April 8.00am 2.00pm in The Josephite Centre and adjacent rooms.

Students will be informed that they are expected to lead this conversation and they will be provided with a series of questions to guide this discussion. The guiding questions are:

- What am I learning?
- · Why am I learning this?
- How am I doing?
- How do I know?
- How can I improve?
- Where can I go for help?

We trust that the information contained within the report is found to be useful and that the meeting with teachers proves to be very beneficial for your child. The College remains committed to the strong partnerships between school and home and we welcome your feedback and questions relating to this Interim Report and the transition to the 2024 school year.

Finally, please note that on Friday 5th April classes for our Year 12 students will continue as per the timetable. Year 7-11 students will only attend school on this day at the time of their interviews. There will be no supervision provided to Year 7-11 students on this day.






