Attendance

As a community committed to the success and well-being of our students, we want to emphasize the critical importance of regular school attendance. Each day your child attends school is a step toward a brighter future, and conversely, each day missed is a lost opportunity for growth and development. We understand that sometimes absences are unavoidable, but together, we can work towards minimising them and ensuring that each student has the best possible chance to succeed. When parents and carers actively and positively involve themselves in their children's education, it helps create a very positive and supportive environment that fosters academic achievement, helps build resilience and enhances their child's personal growth and development. You as parents are the primary educator of your child and your engagement in their learning, beginning with attendance at school is fundamental for several reasons:

Academic Success: Consistent attendance is directly linked to higher academic performance. When students attend school regularly, they are more likely to keep up with daily lessons, participate in class discussions, and complete assignments on time. Missing even a single day can cause gaps in knowledge that may take days or even weeks to recover.

Social Development: School is not just about academics. It is also a place where students develop crucial social skills. Regular interaction with peers helps students build friendships, learn teamwork, and develop communication skills. Absenteeism can hinder this social development, leading to feelings of isolation and disconnectedness.

Emotional Wellbeing: Routine and consistency are vital for the emotional health of students. Regular attendance helps maintain a stable routine, reducing anxiety and fostering a sense of security through positive connections and belonging. Frequent absences can disrupt this stability, contributing to increased stress and emotional challenges.

Future Opportunities: Attendance patterns established during secondary school can influence future habits and opportunities. Colleges and employers often consider attendance records as indicators of reliability and commitment. Good attendance habits set a strong foundation for future success in higher education and the workplace.

As parents you can make a remarkable difference in your child's education and help by:

A SPECIAL REPORT: Respectful Language

In today's world, it is common to hear socially offensive language on the streets, on social media channels, streaming services and in some forms of modern music.

Respectful Language



While swearing is becoming more common and less taboo, the use of derogatory language or the act of swearing at someone, or about someone, is a form of verbal violence. It transgresses the usual rules of social interaction by impinging on an individual's self-image and sense of dignity.

It is becoming apparent that some young people are being influenced by the language they hear. Proliferating the use of swear words can sometimes normalise, glamorise and desensitise their impact for kids who may misunderstand the true meaning of some derogatory terms. Whilst some students may use swearing or derogatory terms as a misguided attempt at belonging, others may use it simply because they are still learning how to moderate their language and are not accustomed to making adjustments to suit different situations.

Although many schools enforce a zero-tolerance policy when it comes to swearing and derogatory language, parents need to also play an important part in enforcing this approach. Parents and carers can be proactive in monitoring what their children are viewing or being exposed to. Discussing the use of words or the origin of some derogatory terms and gaining insight into the reason behind their child's use of such language can help prevent inappropriate or disrespectful language filtering into the classroom or the school yard, which is turn helps to build more tolerant, safe and connected communities.

This Special Report offers a number of guidelines to help manage a suitable approach when discussing the importance of respectful language.






WHAT WILL YOU NEED?

WE'VE GOT YOU


I'm interested, but I'm not sure I where to start - I might need some extra support.

INTRODUCTION TO PROGRAMMING

With the increased use of digital technologies across all school and work industries, this is a course worth any student exploring, along with students who are interested in studying computers, coding, IT or engineering.

Students will study Integrated Development Environments and programming documentation and learn to identify key information, to successfully analyse and deconstruct real-world scenarios into logical communication. Students will explore applying programming concepts, Python syntax and troubleshooting methods, along with learning how to communicate professionally within a team environment and applying abductive reasoning and critical thinking to design a solution

COURSE STARTS:





Study at your own pace

WRITING FOR UNIVERSITY

EPPREP800

Students to complete all course work, at their own pace, within the 4 weeks.

Approx. 20 hours study total.

COURSE CONTENT AVAILABLE: 1st July ALL WORK COMPLETED BY: 26th July This is a course for recommended to students who are completing HSC Standard or Advanced English.

Students will learn to determine what a question is asking, how to use evidence to support arguments and how to structure their argument in response to the question. They will explore devising a reading plan, taking notes, how to organise ideas, edit drafts, construct grammatically correct sentences and using correct referencing systems. Participating in this course would be an advantage for use at school, university and in the work place.

DIGITAL LITERACIES

EPPREP860

Students to complete all course work, at their own pace, within the 4 weeks. **Approx. 20 hours study total.**

COURSE CONTENT AVAILABLE: 1st July ALL WORK COMPLETED BY: 26th July

This course is recommended for all students curious about what real university assignments are like in the 21st century.

Digital literacies and digital medias (podcasts, videos and online presentations) will be analysed, practised and applied specifically from the perspective of what it will be like learning at a university level. Students will develop digital communication skills and will discuss online safety, cyber-security, digital footprints and online reputations. Students will also interact with University software, systems and processes while exploring digital content creation .

INTRODUCTION TO HUMAN BIOLOGY

EPPREP960

Students to complete all course work, at their own pace, within the 4 weeks. **Approx. 20 hours study total.**

COURSE CONTENT AVAILABLE: 1st July ALL WORK COMPLETED BY: 26th July

You do <u>not</u> need to have studied Biology at high school to join this course. This human anatomy course is for any students who are interested in studying Nursing, Occupational Therapy, Nutrition and Dietetics, Speech Pathology, Health and PE, Podiatry, Oral Health, Biomedical Science, Medical Radiation Science or Physiotherapy.

It explores the structure of DNA and structural organisation of the human body, along with the tissue and organ systems, the cardiovascular, respiratory and renal systems, the skeletal, muscular, and the digestive systems. Students will also learn about anatomical position and sectional planes and macromolecules within the body. www.newcastle.edu.au/course/EPPREP960





FOUNDATION CHEMISTRY

EPPREP790

Students to complete all course work, at their own pace, within the 4 weeks. **Approx. 20 hours study total.**

COURSE CONTENT AVAILABLE: 1st July ALL WORK COMPLETED BY: 26th July

This course is designed for those who are not studying Chemistry at school but are interested in studying Chemistry later on at university, or for students or need a refresher of some fundamental chemical concepts before their HSC exams.

Concepts such as writing and balancing chemical equations, using scientific notation, converting SI units and identifying significant figures with be explored. Students will also learn about elements, compounds and mixtures, the periodic table, distinguishing metals, non-metals, liquids and gases and how to outline basic atomic structure.

FOUNDATION PHYSICS

EPPREP900

Students to complete all course work, at their own pace, within the 4 weeks. Approx. 20 hours study total.

COURSE CONTENT AVAILABLE: 1st July ALL WORK COMPLETED BY: 26th July This course is recommended for students who need a refresher of some fundamental concepts of physics or who have <u>not</u> studied physics before but are perhaps interested in studying it later on, at university.

Students will work to solve two dimensional problems, construct vectors and learn about vector calculations. 






CogAT

In Term 2, most students in Year 7 have taken part in the Cognitive Abilities Test (CogAT). This test evaluates students' reasoning abilities in three key areas essential for success in school:

- 1. **Verbal Battery:** Assesses students' ability to reason with words and concepts, crucial for reading comprehension, critical thinking, writing, and verbal learning tasks.
- 2. **Quantitative Battery:** Measures students' ability to reason with quantitative symbols and concepts, which are vital for problem-solving in mathematics and other disciplines.
- 3. **Nonverbal Battery:** Evaluates students' ability to reason with geometric shapes and figures, requiring them to implement strategies for solving novel problems

CogAT aims to support differentiated practice in education by helping teachers adapt instruction to meet the unique needs and abilities of each student.

Students who missed the CogAT test at the first sitting will be offered another opportunity before the end of term. No preparation needed for the tests, apart from a fully charged laptop and extra snacks to maintain a fuelled brain.
