

SMCCG Senior Study Guidelines – Attention Year 11 and 12!

At St Mary's we are committed to providing quality study time to students when they are not in a timetabled class. Study Lessons are scheduled into the senior study space, classrooms and/or library. Students understand that this is time to be taken very seriously, and that they are to come to the sessions with clear study goals. Study Lessons provide a time for completing classwork, preparing study notes, working on major works where applicable, and meeting with mentors or peers for the purpose of learning.

The following norms were agreed upon by staff and students, and are in line with the College Mantra – **Be Safe Be Respectful Be a Learner**

- Each student has the right to a quiet, respectful environment for learning
- Opportunities for individual and group study will be provided
- Groups are to remain respectful of others when collaborating on tasks
- Each student is a unique individual and has autonomy and choice in the way they choose to learn and study
- With rights comes responsibilities including ownership/maintenance of the study environment


Student Rights

- Each student has the right to a quiet, respectful environment for learning
- Students may use earphones for listening to a video/online resource
- Students may have access to studying in an outdoor space (when timetabled in the senior study space)
- Students have the right to be autonomous in how they wish to use this time, so long as it is for the purposes of learning and/or wellbeing (eg mindfulness activity or Mentor-Mentee conference)

Student Responsibilities

- Students will arrive to the Study Period on time and ensure that they are marked present for the session.
- Students are responsible in maintaining work habits that align with the college mantra Be Safe Be Respectful Be a Learner, showing respect for others by doing their part to create an atmosphere that supports learning.
- Students are responsible for cleaning and maintaining L7 senior study area
- Students are responsible for adherence to the Mobile Phone Policy.

Mathematics at St Mary's 2024

Welcome to the new school year St Mary's students, parents and caregivers. As many students have noted this year, our Mathematics classes have been named after famous Mathematicians.

Classes for Years 7 to 10 labelled as:

MAT.T – is named after Terence **Tao**. He is an Australian mathematician, who was born and raised in Adelaide and by the age of 21 he received his PhD from Princeton University, USA. He is currently a professor of mathematics at the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA), where he holds the James and Carol Collins chair. In 2006, Tao was awarded a Fields Medal in 2006, which is acknowledged to being the "Nobel Prize of Mathematics".

MAT.A - Archimedes of Syracuse is considered the greatest mathematician of ancient history, and one of the greatest of all time. Archimedes anticipated modern calculus and analysis by applying the concept of the infinitely small and the method of exhaustion to derive and rigorously prove a range of geometrical theorems. These include the area of a circle, the surface area and volume of a sphere, the area of an ellipse, the area under a parabola, the volume of a segment of a paraboloid of revolution, the volume of a segment of a hyperboloid of revolution, and the area of a spiral.

MAT.F – Leonardo **Fibonacci**, was an Italian mathematician from the Republic of Pisa, considered to be "the most talented Western mathematician of the Middle Ages". One of his famous mathematical patterns is known as the Fibonacci sequence, where each number is the sum of the previous two numbers: 0, 1, 1, 2, 3, 5, 8, 13, 21, 34, ...

MAT.G -Marie-Sophie **Germain** was a French mathematician, physicist, and philosopher. Her work on <u>Fermat's Last Theorem</u> provided a foundation for mathematicians exploring the subject for hundreds of years after.

MAT.H - Hypatia was a mathematician who lived in Alexandria, Egypt, then part of the Eastern Roman Empire. Not only was she a mathematician but a philosopher as well. She taught as the head at a school, her subject was the knowledge of Plato and Aristotle. She is the first woman to make valuable contributions in the field of mathematics.

MAT.J - Creola Katherine **Johnson** was an American mathematician whose calculations of orbital mechanics as a NASA employee were critical to the success of the first and subsequent U.S. crewed spaceflights. The 2016 film "Hidden Figures" portrayed her substantial mathematical work with NASA.


MAT.P- Pythagoras of Samos was an ancient Ionian Greek philosopher, polymath and the eponymous founder of Pythagoreanism. Since at least the first century BC, Pythagoras has commonly been given credit for discovering the Pythagorean theorem, a theorem in geometry that states that "in a right-angled triangle the square of the hypotenuse is equal to the sum of the squares of the two other sides": $c^2 = a^2 + b^2$.

Our Year 7 Maths classes at the start of term are based on English streaming, and these Maths classes will be restreamed later this term. The Mathematics Faculty will monitor student learning in the Maths classroom, monitor achievements in class tasks as well as in common tasks. From the demonstration of skills and knowledge. There will be some class changes this term based on demonstrated skills and knowledge, to ensure that students are placed in classes that best match their learning needs and styles. Please be assured that all students have the same opportunities as their peers in following the curriculum with a variety of strategies for each student to learn and progress.

Our Year 8, 9 and 10 classes have already been streamed based on each student's progress last year. Year 10 are currently completing their Stage 5 courses- 5.3. 5.2 or 5.1 level, while Years 7, 8 and 9 have started the new NESA syllabus courses for Stages 4 and 5.

For these new courses the syllabus follows a **Core—Paths structure** which is designed to encourage aspiration in students and provide the flexibility needed to enable teachers to create pathways for students working towards Stage 6. The aim for most students is to demonstrate achievement of the Core and as many Path outcomes as possible by the end of Stage 5.

The Core outcomes provide students with the foundation for Mathematics Standard 2 in Stage 6. Students who require ongoing support in completing all Stage 5 Core outcomes may consider either Mathematics Standard 1 or the Numeracy CEC course in Stage 6. Pathways in Stage 5 will be carefully planned to ensure some students have the opportunity to engage with Advanced and Extension courses.




Our Year 11 and 12 Stage 6 courses for Numeracy, Standard, Advanced and Extension are underway. Students will be working towards completing mandatory assessments.

At St Mary's our students will continue to have access to digital resources such as Mathsonline, HotMaths or Edrolo to assist with their Mathematics learning.

May the year be filled with curiosity, perseverance, and success in the world of mathematics. Whether it's solving a challenging problem or grasping a new concept, every achievement is worth acknowledging. If there are any questions or concerns, please contact the Mathematics Department.

WHO IS IT FOR?

The ASPIRE Concert Band is a Diocesan ensemble for students in Years 5-12. It is suitable for students who can at least play at a 1st grade (AMEB) level as well students of a more advanced ability, 4th grade (AMEB) and above. The ensemble is not suitable for beginner students.

Instruments include: Flute, clarinet, oboe, bassoon, bass clarinet, saxophone, trumpet, trombone, french horn, euphonium, tuba, mallet/auxiliary percussion and drum kit. The band is not suitable for string or piano players.

Students must know how to read traditional music notation.
